
International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme

The International Baccalaureate aims to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect. To this end the organization works with schools, governments and international organizations to develop challenging programmes of international education and rigorous assessment. These programmes encourage students across the world to become active, compassionate and lifelong learners who understand that other people, with their differences, can also be right.

Discovery Middle School is an official Middle Years Programme (MYP) school. MYP is part of the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) and aims to develop three fundamental concepts in our students: intercultural awareness, holistic learning and communication.

MYP Teaching Through Global Context (Lens)

Orientation in Space & Time: Personal histories; homes and journeys; turning points in humankind discoveries; explorations and migrations of humankind; the relationships between, and the interconnectedness of, individuals and civilizations, from personal, local and global perspectives.



Identities & Relationships: Identify; beliefs and values; personal, physical, mental, social and spiritual health; human relationships including families, friends, communities and cultures; what it means to be human.

Personal & Cultural Expression: The way in which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values; the ways in which we reflect on, extend and enjoy our creativity; our appreciation of the aesthetic.

<u>Globalization & Sustainability:</u> The interconnectedness of human-made systems and communities; the relationships between local and global processes; how local experiences mediate the global; reflect on the opportunities and tensions provided by world-interconnectedness; the impact of decision-making on humankind and the environment.

Fairness & Development: Rights and responsibilities; the relationship between communities; sharing finite resources with other people and with other living things; access to equal opportunities; peace and conflict resolution.

Scientific & Technical Innovation: The natural world and its laws; the interaction between people and the natural world; how humans use their understanding of scientific principles; the impact of scientific and technological advances on communities and environments; the impact of environments on

human activity; how humans adapt environments to their needs.

IB Learner Profile

(Property of the IBO)

The aim of all IB programmes is to develop internationally minded people who, recognizing their common humanity and shared guardianship of the planet, will help to create a better and more peaceful world. IB learners strive to be:

September: Learners who are **Open-Minded** understand and appreciate their own cultures and personal histories. They are open to the perspectives, values, and traditions of others.

October: Caring learners show empathy, compassion and respect towards the needs and feelings of others. They act to make a positive difference to the lives of others.

November: **Thinkers** use both critical and creative thinking to approach complex problems. They understand that sometimes there are no "simple" answers.

December: Communicators are able to express ideas and information confidently, often in more than one language. They work well with others.

January: Learners who are **Principled** act with integrity and honesty and with a strong sense of fairness. They take responsibility for their actions.

February: Inquirers are naturally curious and enjoy researching to learn new things.

March: Risk-Takers approach unfamiliar situations and uncertainty with courage and forethought.

April: Learners who are Knowledgeable are interested in local and global issues.

May: Learners who are **Balanced** understand the importance of maintaining a balance between the intellectual, physical, and emotional elements of their lives.

June: **Reflective** learners give thoughtful consideration to their own learning and experience. They know their own strengths and limitations.

Discovery MYP Policy Abstracts

Assessment

The MYP model allows for students to demonstrate proficiency on essential state standards using the MYP rubrics. The assessments allow for multiple opportunities to show proficiency on each criteria objective, which are assessed 2 times or more per year. Students can resubmit assessments for a higher score, at their own pace, within a trimester. MYP assessments are graded on an eight point rubric and will be reported to families through Skyward as part of their summative assessment grade.

Academic Honesty

It is Discovery Middle School's expectation that all students strive to become *principled* learners. Principled students act "with integrity and honesty, with a strong sense of fairness and justice, and with respect for the dignity and rights of people everywhere." Only through original student work can understanding and mastery of academic content be truly measured.

Plagiarism, or the copying and use of someone else's work without proper acknowledgement or citation, is not permitted, nor is it permissible for any student to allow another student to copy their work. Plagiarism occurs when someone takes the ideas or writings of others and presents them as if they were his or her own.

Language Policy

All teachers at Discovery Middle School are language teachers in the language of English, as the study of language is the foundation for all learning. Language allows students to become learners through reading, writing, speaking, and listening.

The study of a second language provides students the opportunity to develop international understanding, compassion, and respect. Part of the MYP program is to offer a second language to students not currently in another academic elective (Avid, Leadership, Yearbook, or Academic Prep). Discovery Middle School offers Spanish to all students not in an academic elective as part of the MYP program.

Inclusion

Discovery has many student and family supports and resources to ensure an inclusive learning environment for all of our students. These include the Family Community Resource Center (FCRC) and social-emotional support through various programs and staff members.

Each month the school focuses on one MYP Learner Profile characteristic. At the end of the month, teachers nominate students to be recognized for demonstrating this characteristic. Nominated students are honored with a certificate of the learner profile for that month as well as recognition in the school announcements.

MYP Community Service & 8th Grade Community Service Project

Service Learning is a foundation of the MYP program. Students will be given opportunities to engage in Service Learning in their courses. Students are also encouraged to pursue their own service opportunities that they are passionate about. Service can either be Direct (face-to-face, Indirect (behind the scenes, supporting), Research (learning about and reporting on a topic), or Advocacy (promoting awareness or change on an issue).

Students in grades 6 are encouraged to complete 4 hours of service work, while students in grade 7 are encouraged to complete 8 hours. Students may submit their hours using the QR code posted around the school to track MYP service hours. Students are recognized for completing their service hours at the end of the school year with an award.

All 8th grade students will have the opportunity and support to complete a Community Service Project. This is with a group of 1-3 students and on topics chosen by the student. Students will have a staff mentor, time in the school schedule to research, plan, and reflect on their project. The action steps may need to take place outside of school. Students will present their project in May to their staff mentor and receive feedback. The total service hours is around 16 or more hours for the project, estimated. Students are recognized for completing the Community Project at the end of the school year with an award. 3 students are also chosen by staff to receive the 8th Grade Community Service Award, The Colonel Terry Nelson Award based on their demonstration of the Learner Profiles and their service project completion and impact.

MYP Community Service & 8th Grade Community Service Project

Community Service & Service Learning are opportunities available to students in all grades during the school day and outside of school hours. Students in grades 6 are encouraged to complete 4 hours, while students in grade 7 are encouraged to complete 8 hours. Students may submit their hours on the Discovery website (MYP section) or complete and submit a form in the office. All 8th grade students will complete a Community Service Project totaling 15+hours.

Through the FCRC there are many volunteer opportunities for parents as well as opportunities to donate gently used clothing for our clothes closet. Please stop in and introduce yourself. School Nurses help students and their families manage all kinds of health issues at school every day:

- Students with ongoing problems including asthma, diabetes, migraines, scoliosis, ADHD, allergies, seizures or other chronic illnesses that may require medication or special instructions
- Students and parents with questions about a new symptom, injury, diagnosis or treatment;
- Students returning to school with instructions from the Emergency Room or their health provider that need extra support;
- Students and families needing referrals for vision, dental care, insurance and other health needs

Together with our Registrar, I ensure students meet WA immunization requirements. In early spring, I'll arrange vision and hearing screening for our 7th graders. Our health room is also open every day for first aid and medications. It is staffed by our attendance clerk and supported by other office staff. Please request a Medication Authorization form if your student needs to take any kind of medicine at school. **Please keep your Emergency Contact phone numbers up to date so we can reach you quickly when necessary.**

Attendance & Procedures

All students enrolled in Vancouver Public Schools are expected to be at school and in class on time.

Excusing an Absence - Absences may be excused for the following reasons (P3122):

- Illness, a doctor's note is required if a student is ill for five (5) or more days in a month, unless the principal, for good cause, waives the requirement;
- Health care appointments; please provide note from the doctor.
- Emergencies, including but not limited to a death or illness in the family;
- Participation in a district or school approved activity or instructional program. Such absences shall be approved by the principal or designee;
- Religious or cultural activities, including observance of a religious or cultural holiday or participation in religious or cultural instruction;
- Deployment activities of an active duty military parent or guardian;
- Prearranged absences that the principal (or designee) and parent agree upon on approved activity. The school cannot excuse absences for trips taken by students unless these trips involve direct supervision by the school or the family.

Absences must be excused by a parent within three days after the student absence in one of the following ways:

- Call the attendance line at 360-313-3320
- Send an e-mail to <u>discovery.attendance@vansd.org;</u> or
- Enter the absence into Skyward Family Access (Attendance Tab); or
- Send a written note to the attendance office

It is the responsibility of the student or parent to arrange for any needed make-up work.

Unexcused absences will result in an automated phone call notifying the parents of the absence.

Truancy

Children between the ages of 8 and 18 years of age are required to attend school. Truancy is when a student is not in school and the absence is unexcused.

After three (3) unexcused absences, the school will schedule a conference with the student and parent.

Not later than the student's fifth (5th) unexcused absence in a month the district will enter into an agreement with the student and parents that establishes school attendance requirements.

At some point after the second (2nd) and before the fifth (5th) unexcused absence, the district will take data-informed steps to eliminate or reduce the student's absences. These steps will include application of the Washington Assessment of the Risks and Needs of Students (WARNS) or other assessment by the district's designated employee.

After seven (7) unexcused absences in a month, or ten (10) in a year, the student will be referred to the Office of Student Welfare and Attendance to file an initial petition with the court.

Tardy Policy

A student is tardy when he/she enters the classroom after the tardy bell and within the first fifteen (15) minutes of class time. It is considered an unexcused absence if the student is more than fifteen (15) minutes late to class and will be marked with the code of "V" in the attendance. Teachers will address the first four tardies before referring to administration for disciplinary action.

Departing Early

Students are expected to remain on campus from the time of arrival until excused. Students who ride the bus are to remain on campus once they arrive. Students who need to check out early for illness or appointments must report to the attendance office BEFORE leaving campus. Failure to do so will result in truancy, regardless of later returning to school with a note from a parent. Parents coming to pick students up from school must check in at the main office. Students will not be released during the last hour of school unless prearranged and approved by the principal.

Closed Campus

Discovery Middle School is a closed campus; this means once a student arrives on campus, he/she may not leave without written parental permission given to the attendance office. *This includes leaving campus after being dropped off by buses or parents in the AM.* Parents/Guardians are asked to sign students out when they leave and in again when they return during the school day.

Breakfast/Lunch

Our building is open to students for breakfast at 8:30. Breakfast and lunch served daily. Current meal prices and the school menu are available on our district webpage.

Students have a 30 minute lunch period. During that time, we ask students to stay in the designated areas (inside seated or outside within the boundaries). All food and beverage are to remain in the cafeteria. Students remain seated until they are excused. Once excused, they push in or stack their chair, clean up after themselves, then dump/recycle their remaining unwanted items. **Please avoid bringing glass containers**.

Progress and Final grades are recorded and posted each trimester. Trimester 1 (8/30-11/7): progress reports home October 17, report card home November 21 Trimester 2 (11/8-3/13): progress reports home February 8, report card home March 24 Trimester 3 (3/14-6/15): progress reports home May 15, report card mailed home June 23 pending fines

Student Recognition

Our students deserve recognition when doing well. This recognition may take the form of a positive comment, an MYP Learner Profile Award, or one of several special awards given throughout the year. Below is a partial list of those awards:

Honor Roll & Principal's Honor Roll: Those students who earn and maintain a 3.0 or better grade point average for 1st and 2nd trimester will be invited to celebrate with family for a special recognition event.

MYP Learner Profile Awards: Each month the school focuses on one Learner Profile characteristic. At the end of the month, teachers nominate students to be recognized for demonstrating this characteristic. Students are honored during the day and a note is mailed home.

Colonel Terry Nelson Award: The Colonel Terry Nelson Award recognizes an exceptional 8th grade student who represents the Middle Years Programme Learner Profile. Nominees are recognized for their community service, academic achievement, and overall citizenship and leadership; this presentation is made the last day of school during the final assembly.

CATS, Athletic Core Covenant Awards for Commitment, Attitude, Teamwork & Sportsmanship each season, each sport.

Extracurricular activities are an important part of life at Discovery. **We encourage all students to participate, helping them to become better citizens and meet new people.** *Some Clubs and Activities (Band, Orchestra, Choir, Math Club, Theater, Leadership) may have a \$20 fee each. *See fee schedule. Among the opportunities are:

<u>Student Leadership/Associated Student Body (ASB)</u> this is a class offered during the school day for 6th, 7th and 8th grade students who have successfully completed an application process. These students work to plan school activities and events. They represent the entire Associated Student Body of Discovery (ASB).

<u>Intramurals</u> offer academic enrichment opportunities after school from 3:30-4:10, two sessions a year (fall and spring) no cost to families. Transportation is provided for those normally on a school bus; parents and students must register to attend (watch for signups).

Athletics: In order to be eligible to compete in athletic contests, student athletes must maintain sufficient academic progress and meet attendance & behavioral expectations. The Middle School Philosophy is "no cut, equal playing time for all". Specific details are included in the athletic registration packet on line or in the business office. Parents are asked to pick their students up from athletic events or arrange for rides. One-way busing will be used whenever possible. All athletic fines must be paid in order to be cleared to compete in athletic competitions. Students must have a valid physical to be cleared to start practice. Each sport requires a valid ASB Card (a one time, \$10 purchase each calendar year) and the sport specific fee of \$20.00. There is a \$3 replacement fee for lost ASB cards. These funds are used to help defray the cost of equipment, cleaning/repair/replacement of uniforms, transportation, officials, and other related expenses.

Common Expectations

The Discovery community has developed Common Expectations for the purpose of creating a positive culture focused on **SAFETY, RESPONSIBILITY, and RESPECT with EMPATHY**, that allows and facilitates high levels of learning. Staff members will be intentional in teaching, modeling and periodically reviewing the common expectations throughout the year. We ask that every student follow the Common Expectations & the **Discovery Givens** which are:

- Keep your hands and feet to yourself
- Follow the First 10/Last 10 not leaving the classroom during the first or last 10 minutes of the period
- Use appropriate language and voice level
- Follow adult directions the first time given
- Help Maintain a clean campus
- Respect personal space & property of others

Common Academic Standards

In addition to the MYP foundation of challenging academic programs and rigorous common assessments, our Discovery Community shares Common Academic Standards:

1. Identify "Triangle of Learning" within each classroom (Learning Targets, Inquiry Questions & Global Contexts)- Know "what" you're learning, -Know "why" you're learning it

2. Use Learning Guide in each class--If Learning Guide is lost, use available Learning Guide papers, purchase a replacement in the business office or use your iPad calendar/organization features.

3. Participate in class routines & instruction within each classroom.

4. Follow all Common Expectations, "Learning Guide expectations", School, District and State Policies/Procedures

Personal Safety

- Health Dept. guidelines prohibit students from sharing food/beverages with others
- Students are prohibited from giving or receiving any medications, vitamins, pills or drugs of any type
- When walking to/from school travel with a friend

- Report any unusual situations to the school, your parents/guardians or call 911 immediately
- Always stick to the safe/usual route
- Use the cross walks and sidewalks when available. Follow all safety and traffic rules
- Use the appropriate cross walk in the bus zone
- Wear a helmet & walk your bike on campus

- Valuables, large sums of money, etc. should be left at home; the school is not responsible for lost or stolen items
- Never share your personal passwords or locker combinations
- Lock and secure your items while in PE, and don 't leave your personal items unattended
- Students are prohibited from buying/selling unauthorized items at school

Safety/ Evacuation Drills

- Change of bus requests can be approved in the main office in the AM
- Bus Notes required to ride with friends
- Changes in bus routes/stops must be approved

We conduct monthly safety and evacuation drills. Students are asked to stay calm, follow the directions of staff, and remain quiet for instructions. Evacuation maps are posted in each classroom. Should an emergency or disaster ever arise in our area while school is in session, the building staff at Discovery has prepared to respond effectively. Students will be cared for until we are able to safely release them to authorized emergency release contacts (with picture ID). On site student release location is the commons/cafeteria. Please make sure your phone numbers and emergency contacts are up to date! Your cooperation is necessary in any emergency.

Discipline at Discovery

Our primary goal is to teach and effect change over time, to promote positive citizenship and healthy behavioral choices. We believe in teaching students how to be respectful and appropriate in school: living the core values of the learner profile. Proactive efforts yield the greatest positive impact on student behavior and learning and we at Discovery provide opportunities for students to learn behavioral expectations and practice empathy for others in an effort to reduce the use of disciplinary actions. When harm is caused in school we offer Restorative Justice Practices as a way for students to take accountability for their actions, learn how their behavior impacts others, and create a plan to make things right while giving back to the community. Restorative Practices consist of intentionally planned and facilitated conversations that allow everyone involved in an incident to share their perspectives and work together to repair harm. Restorative Practices are always voluntary and may be offered as an alternative or supplement to more traditional school discipline measures. If you are curious about Restorative Practices at Discovery please contact our building coach Emma Forslund.

Range of Disciplinary Action

Depending on the situation, a student may receive the following behavior consequences:

- Classroom redirection/warning/seat change
- Minor Infraction documentation
- Buddy room (removed temporarily from setting to decompress/reflect & return)
- Phone call home
- Lunch, before or after school detention
- Referral to administration
- Tuesday School (3:30-4:30)
- In-school suspension
- Short term or long term suspension
- Expulsion

The following behaviors will result in consequences:

• Fighting or assault

Items NOT Allowed at School


- Illegal substances (drugs, alcohol, tobacco, vapes, and drug/alcohol paraphernalia)
- Valuables/large amounts of money/expensive jewelry
- Scooters/skates/Heelys
- Laser pens/pointers
- Lighters/matches/fireworks, live ammunition/shell casings
- Safety pins and other potentially dangerous items
- Permanent markers/paint pens
- Glass items / containers
- Toy guns, knives of any kind, baseball bats, throwing stars or any "look-alikes". If brought, could result in suspension, emergency expulsion, expulsion and/or arrest.

- Encouraging or watching a fight or assault. If a student is asked by a staff member to leave while a fight or assault is in progress, he or she must do so immediately. The consequences are the same for an observer as they are for a participant ("Inciting").
- Threatening, harassing, sexually harassing, or intimidating another student
- Continued classroom disruption or insubordination in the classroom even after the teacher has used appropriate classroom steps
- Defiance toward a staff member
- Continued lack of cooperation
- Vandalism or theft
- Any public display of affection beyond hand holding and/or a brief hug
 - Perfume/cologne body sprays (lotions /deodorants)
 - Cell phones to remain silenced or off (or could be confiscated to be returned at the end of the day or picked up by a parent)
 - Blankets/pillows/stuffed animals
 - Balloons, Water Balloons
 - Deliveries of flowers, gifts, balloons or birthday food
 - Deliveries of fast food from any outside vendor; such as Uber Eats, DoorDash, Grubhub, BringMeThat, etc.

If You Have a Concern or You Want to Appeal a Decision

- If the situation involves a staff member, please contact the staff member first to discuss
- If the situation is one where a counselor might be of assistance, contact one of them directly
- The next in line for an appeal is the Associate Principal
- If the student or parent has still not reached a satisfactory resolution, contact the principal
- The next step for appeal/due process would be the Chief of Secondary Education. In the event of an appeal of a suspension
 or expulsion, the Office of Student Welfare and Attendance should be contacted

Discovery Middle School Academic Honesty Policy

It is Discovery Middle School's policy that plagiarism and cheating by students in any form is not permitted. Only through actual student work can the student's understanding and mastery of academic content be truly measured. Plagiarism, or the copying and use of someone else's work without proper acknowledgement, is not permitted, **nor is it permissible for any student to allow another student to copy their work. Plagiarism** occurs when someone takes the ideas or writings of others and presents them as if they were his or her own. This definition includes all print and electronic sources as well as computer programs and artwork.

Plagiarism and cheating include but are not limited to:

- 1. Copying another's work, whether from a book, article or website without giving credit.
- 2. Copying another student's assignment.
- 3. Submitting another student's work as your own.
- 4. Paraphrasing (rewording) of another's work without giving credit to the author.
- 5. Cutting and pasting sections of several pieces of others' work into a new whole without giving credit.
- 6. Recycling previously submitted work.

Consequences of plagiarism/cheating: Assignments found to be plagiarized will earn a grade of zero. Students are allowed one chance in their middle school career to rewrite a plagiarized assignment. Any further instances of plagiarism may result in appropriate sanctions as needed.

Laptop Guidelines for Use Discovery Middle School

During class:

- Laptops use depends on teacher's expectations. The Laptop is to be used with teacher permission only.
- If a device is being used without permission:
 - o Progressive discipline will be used starting with:
 - 1. Teacher gives verbal warning and will maintain disciplinary records.
 - 2. Student keeps iPad in backpack for the period.
 - 3. Parent is contacted about appropriate use.
 - 4. Laptop infraction documentation/ Office assigns progressive discipline each trimester.

Before and after school:

- Laptop use is allowed.
- To avoid theft and/or damage, students should know where their Laptops are at all times. Laptops should never be left unattended.

When traveling in the hallways:

• Laptops should be closed, strapped and put away.

During lunch:

- To avoid damage from food and beverages, Laptops are to be safely stored off the tables for the first 15 minutes of lunch.
- Laptop use is allowed after the release to recess as long as there is no food nor drink at the table. Students should know where their Laptops are at all times. Laptops should never be left unattended. (Students need to report a lost or stolen Laptop immediately.

Personal Electronic Device Guidelines for Use

Discovery Middle School

*Personal electronic devices need to be powered down from 9:00 am-3:30pm and stored away; the exception being lunch.

During lunch:

- Use of personal electronic devices is okay (unless there is explicit content and/or inappropriate use.)
- It's okay to listen to music while you are seated at your table. Take ear buds out when speaking or listening to others (no speakers allowed).
- Taking pictures/video of other students is not permitted.

During class:

*Staff may give students permission to use their personal electronic device in class, but are to be used under teacher direction only.

- Device use depends on teacher's expectations. Personal electronic devices are to be used with teacher permission only. This includes listening to music on earbuds.
- If a personal electronic device is being used without permission, progressive discipline will be imposed as follows:
 - o 1. A verbal warning from the teacher
 - o 2. Parent contact
 - O 3. Personal electronic device locked in the office and picked up by the student at the end of the day (The **second** time a device is taken, it needs to be picked up by a **parent** at the end of the day.)
 - o 4. Other office discipline as appropriate

VPS 1:1 TECHNOLOGY RESPONSIBLE USE AND SAFETY AGREEMENT

PURPOSE: Vancouver Public Schools (VPS) may issue students a one-to-one (1:1) technology device, cords, charging brick, and stylus (for Chromebooks) that can be used both at school and at home as a means to promote achievement and provide flexible learning opportunities.

VPS expects that students will use district-issued equipment responsibly and only for school purposes. This agreement is required for students to be issued a device for school purposes and represents the student and parent's commitment to holding accountable the student to using the district technology resources as expected and to care for the equipment in order to keep it in good working order, avoid damage, loss, or theft.

The following are highlights of things to consider when using your school issued equipment:

- Charge your device at home every night and bring it to school each day with a full charge.
- Remember the device, cords, charging brick, and stylus (for Chromebooks) are your responsibility so do not share these items. It is also recommended that you avoid leaving your technology in a vehicle or unattended to avoid it being stolen.
- Be a responsible Digital Citizen: Recognize the rights, responsibilities, and opportunities of living, learning, and working in an interconnected digital world, and act and model in ways that are safe, legal, and ethical. Communication on district devices must be used for educational use only while maintaining appropriate language at all times.
- Back up important files regularly. VPS maintains 1:1 devices with periodic updates. Students should save files in online storage to avoid accidental loss of data. VPS cannot guarantee data loss will not occur and is not liable for such loss. Ask for assistance if you do not know how to back up your files.
- Follow copyright laws and fair use guidelines. Students critically curate a variety of resources using digital tools to construct knowledge, produce creative artifacts and make meaningful learning experiences for themselves and others. Only download/save music and related to specific assignments.
- Make your 1:1 device available for inspection by any administrator or teacher upon request.
- Keep the device in its school issued case (if applicable). Do not personalize your device with the addition of stickers or tape to any area of the device or case.
- Return the device to school promptly if you un-enroll from the district.

Expectations:

- 1. Do not use devices near food or drink and if damaged return as soon as possible. Devices should be closed and secure during transport and used on a stationary surface unless directed by school staff.
- 2. Always remember that student-issued accounts are to be used only with programs made available by the school or district. School Gmail or other accounts should only be used for applications and resources approved by the district. Use these accounts only for intended purposes.
- 3. Do not attempt to access systems beyond your authorized access or bypass district filters. This includes sharing your account password for any system with others or using another person's account and/or password.
- 4. Do not attempt to locate, view, share, or store materials that are unacceptable in an academic setting. This includes, but is not limited to, pornographic, obscene, racist, graphically violent, or vulgar images, sounds, music, language, video, or other materials. The criteria for acceptability is demonstrated in the types of material made available in the district provided learning materials & resources.
- 5. No taking pictures or videos of other students or staff without their permission.
- 6. No Hacking: "hacking" of any type, including the intentional introduction of malicious software (viruses), attempts to gain unauthorized network or system access, or attempts to disrupt normal network traffic, will result in district discipline and may lead to criminal charges.

On-Line Safety:

- Students should not intentionally reveal or post identifying personal information, files, or communications to unknown persons through email or other means.
- Bullying or harassment, including personal attacks or threats toward anyone using online resources, is strictly prohibited and could result in discipline or lead to criminal charges. *If you are aware of bullying or harassment, please report it to responsible school personnel.*

Notice:

All student 1:1 computing devices are configured to filter internet content and communications at school, at home, and on any other network. While internet filtering is intended to restrict access to inappropriate or non-educational content, the district cannot guarantee that students will not intentionally or unintentionally access content that may be deemed unacceptable. If you access inappropriate content on your device, report it to school staff immediately.

The electronic communications, activities, and files created and/or accessed on district technology are not private and are subject to being viewed, monitored, and/or archived by the district at any time.

Parental/Guardian Monitoring Responsibility:

Despite the filtering measures detailed above, parents and/or guardians assume responsibility for monitoring their student's activity on district-issued devices and accounts during non-school hours and on non-student attendance days. Users are responsible for the appropriate use of the device and all accounts, applications, and services.

If information is collected that indicates activity outside of the acceptable use, that information will be reviewed with the student and/or parent/guardian during normal school business hours.

IMPORTANT SAFETY NOTE: information obtained by school district officials, after school business hours, suggesting or indicating imminent danger to a person(s) will initiate a 911 report upon receiving that information. The Building administration will contact the parents/guardians on the next school business day regarding the matter.

Fiscal Responsibility: The district strives to limit the financial responsibility for families of students issued 1:1 devices. In cases of accidental damage, a 1:1 device will be repaired one time per year at no cost to the family. Other damages will be assessed and a fine assigned to support the repair or replacement of the device. If the device is lost or stolen, and the school determines that the student is not at fault, the replacement fine is a flat fee of \$99.00 iPads, Chromebooks, and \$199 for laptops. If a device is damaged, lost, or stolen due to willful negligence, the family will be responsible for the full cost to repair or replace the 1:1 device. A police report must be filed by the family for all devices stolen when off campus.

By signing this document, you agree to abide by the conditions listed above and assume responsibility for the appropriate and safe use and care of VPS district-issued technology. You understand that should you fail to comply with the terms of this agreement, access to 1:1 technology, the internet, and other digital content or services may be limited. Students may also be subject to disciplinary action as outlined in the VPS Student Code of Conduct.

As the parent or guardian of, my signature indicates I have read and understand this Responsible Use and Safety Agreement and give permission for my student to have access to and use district-issued technology, including access to district-provided digital educational programs, services, and applications.
